Careers

The phlebotomist is a highly trained professional whose primary responsibility is the collection of blood specimens through venipuncture and skin puncture techniques. Blood specimens are tested and analyzed in the clinical laboratory to assess health, or to diagnose and treat disease in patients. Many factors can contribute to the accuracy of a patient's laboratory test results, and proper sample collection is one of the most critical aspects of clinical laboratory testing. Phlebotomists must be educated and trained in the collection and handling of blood specimens of the highest quality. This requires not only a high level of technical skill in the performance of collection procedures, but also a broad knowledge of laboratory tests and the specimens they require, a focused

attention to details such as proper patient identification and preparation, compassionate interpersonal skills in interactions with patients, and knowledge of correct safety procedures for the protection of their patients and themselves. Phlebotomists are also charged with receiving and processing patient specimens other than blood, such as urine and body fluids. The role of phlebotomist has evolved in different environments to include many other responsibilities besides specimen collection, and education in basic laboratory testing procedures is essential. Phlebotomists are employed in a wide variety of settings, including hospital laboratories, clinics, physician offices, private laboratories, blood collection centers, home health agencies and performing home visits for insurance agencies.

Job Outlook

Rapid job growth and excellent job opportunities are expected. Most jobs will continue to be in hospitals, but employment will grow faster in other settings. Employment of clinical laboratory workers is expected to grow 14 percent between 2006 and 2016, faster than the average for all occupations. The volume of laboratory tests continues to increase with both population growth and the development of new types of tests.

Earnings

According to the American Society for Clinical Pathology in 2005: Phlebotomist hourly rate is \$11.70, hospital; \$12.15, private clinics; and \$11.25, physician office laboratory.

Educational Opportunities in Phlebotomy at LCCC

Certificate of Proficiency in Phlebotomy

This program prepares its graduates for employment as phlebotomists in hospitals, clinics, private laboratories, physician offices and blood donation centers (such as the Lorain County Blood Bank and Red Cross collection centers). Various health care professionals involved with the collection of blood specimens may desire to become certified as phlebotomists. The phlebotomy program at LCCC prepares individuals not only to become proficient in the collection of blood samples, but also prepares for eligibility to take the American Society of Clinical Pathologists (ASCP) Board of Registry certification examination or the National Certifying Agency (NCA) for Medical Laboratory Personnel certifying examination. Those passing the examination become certified as phlebotomists (PBT-ASCP or CLPIb-NCA).

Note: Graduates of LCCC's certificate of proficiency in practical nursing and certificate of proficiency in medical assisting programs need only to complete three core courses from the phlebotomy program to receive an additional certificate of completion, in phlebotomy.

Note: Students enrolled in the medical assisting program may earn an associate degree of applied science by completing courses in the phlebotomy program, along with other requirements.

Associate of science
